When Is Chinese New Year?

Chinese New Year doesn't happen on the 1st January.

This is because the date of Chinese New Year is worked out according to the first day of the Chinese lunar calendar, which depends on the movements of the Sun and the Moon.


The celebration lasts for 15 days and falls somewhere between 21st Jan and the 19th Feb, meaning it won't always be on the same date every year.

People spring-clean their houses and gardens to sweep away any bad luck. Debts are paid and any work is brought up-to-date ready for a new year. Houses are decorated with many red decorations. One of these decorations is red couplets which are Chinese good luck sayings on vertical banners used to frame doorways.





New Year's Eve

This is a very special night when families gather together and have a large, traditional feast of fish and chicken.

Traditionally, people in northern provinces of China eat steamed dumplings.

In the south, people traditionally eat a sticky sweet rice pudding.





New Year's Day

Children wake up to find red envelopes filled with money and sweets under their pillow.



Every family member starts the day with brand new clothes from head to toe. Red is a very popular colour for clothing as it is considered lucky.

Family and friends celebrate long after Chinese New Year's Day.

Day 2: It is believed to be the birthday of all dogs so dogs are fed special foods.

Day 3: People visit the Temple of Wealth and have their futures told.

Day 4: People go back to work and many businesses have department dinners or social events for their employees.

Day 7: This day is considered everyone's birthday

Day 8 - 10: These days involve birthday celebrations for the Jade Emperor

Day 13: Everyone becomes a vegetarian on this day as so much food has been eaten.

Day 14: This day is spent resting and preparing for the Lantern Festival, the last day of the Chinese New Year.

The 15th day is also known as the Lantern Festival. Lanterns of various shapes, sizes and colours can be seen in homes, shopping centres, streets and parks.

There are also dragon and lion dancing parades in the streets and firework displays.




Families walk the streets carrying lit lanterns. Candles are lit outside homes to guide wayward spirits home.
